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February is Black History Awareness Month

In the US we celebrate Black History Awareness Month annually. With our specific focus at NCPD being one that looks at the aspects of disability ministry and our Catholic family at every opportunity, we invite you to take this month to examine your ministry and its focus to strengthen your programs and outreach as applied in the context of 25% of our global Catholic family, those of African descent (see study below as linked to the National Black Catholic Congress at www.nbcccongress.org).

A study was commissioned by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in November, 2002, conducted under contract by the Center for Educational Partnerships, a not-for-profit educational organization based in Chicago, IL., to achieve some reliable statistics in relationship to Catholic school children with disabilities. Ethnicity was one of the criteria examined. The November 2002 publication is available at www.usccb.org through searching in "fed asst idea".

Although other studies have shown that minority students are disproportionately represented in special education in public schools, the study finds:

- Catholic school children with disabilities appear to be enrolled in roughly the same proportion by ethnicity as their non-disabled peers;
- 10.9 percent of the Catholic school population is Hispanic; 9 percent of Catholic school children with disabilities are Hispanic;
- 8 percent of the Catholic school population is African-American; 9 percent of Catholic school children with disabilities are African-American.

Ethnic populations vary throughout the United States, but within the context of your diocese, parish and community, how are the needs of those with ethnic diversity being addressed in your programs: catechetical, youth ministry, Catholic schools, adult education, etc..., and more to our point, how are those with disability being identified, sought out for leadership and their giftedness, and served by our Church? Black History Month is a great reminder for us to be mindful of our brothers and sisters of African descent with disabilities as we continue to seek ways to strengthen the cultural diversity of our dioceses, parishes and ministries.



Year for Priests: Fr. Mike Joly

Bishop Francis DiIorenzo installed Father Mike Joly as pastor of St. Joan of Arc Parish in Yorktown, Virginia on Sunday, November 8 2009. Fr. Mike has enjoyed three and a half years in Campus Ministry at the College of William and Mary and serves various needs as director of retreats, parish missions, youth rallies and conferences. Fr. Mike also happens to be totally blind and has been since he was five years old.

Father Joly says his story is not about success, but about hope. "Hope is something divine," he said in an interview with the New York Times after he was ordained 15 years ago. "The only thing I am to anyone who's interested in listening is a committed sign of hope. Look at the power of hope." Fr. Mike said. At his ordination, he prayed from a sacramentary, a book used by priest during Mass, that he created with a computer and a Braille printer. Joly had set out to reproduce some of the essential works for use in Catholic worship in Braille, for himself and other blind priests. The priests he knows of became blind after they were already ordained.



Father Mike grew up in Cumberland, Rhode Island, one of ten children reared by Armand Joly, his father, a police officer and salesman. Michael developed a brain tumor at age five and the surgery to remove the growth left him blind.

His sister Nancy McNally says, "Our father basically gave Mike a choice between feeling sorry for himself or doing something with his life." ([continued](#))


