

NCPD News and Notes

20th Anniversary of the ADA coming soon!

July 26, 2010 is the 20th Anniversary of the signing of the Americans with Disability Act (ADA). Did you know that when the ADA was first debated on the floor of the U.S. Senate, the following words were read by one of the prime sponsors:

"Defense of the right to life implies the defense of other rights which enable the individual with a disability to achieve the fullest measure of personal development. . . . These include the right to equal opportunity in education, in employment, in housing, as well as the right to free access to public accommodations, facilities and services. Passage of this bill will mean discrimination solely on the basis of handicaps will be not only immoral but illegal."

These words came from a letter of support from the U.S. Catholic bishops. We can be proud of our bishops' support of the intent of that public legislation. The intention of the ADA is to ensure that children and adults with disabilities receive equal opportunities to participate in society, free from discrimination. This goal of the 1990 legislation is consistent with the very highest social justice teachings associated with a life of faith.

The 1978 *Pastoral Statement of the U.S. Catholic Bishops on People with Disabilities* preceded the ADA by 12 years. In that wonderful document, (for a copy click on [Bishops' Statements](#)), our U.S. Bishops sent a call and challenge to the Church on behalf of people with disabilities. The Gospel message, this *Pastoral* and subsequent documents remain the fuel of our ministry with and for people with disability today. Let us take advantage of the 20th anniversary of the ADA to once again bring to the attention of our parishes and dioceses the message of disability ministry. We can maximize this opportunity to engage people with disabilities in our parishes and dioceses, as well as in our public communities.

Get the Word Out: write editorials and op-eds for your parish bulletins and local newspapers; blog, tweet, and post on your social networks; and talk with family, friends and co-workers about the ADA, what it has meant, and what it still can mean in the years to come. Some people have never heard of the *1978 U.S. Bishops' Pastoral*. Take this opportunity to bring it to their attention ([click here](#)).

Read NCPD's 56-page booklet, *A Loving Justice, The Moral and Legal Responsibilities of the U.S. Catholic Church under the Americans with Disabilities Act*, Edited by Janice Benton, 1995, NCPD. Pages 17-42 specifically address "Responding to Common Concerns of the Catholic Community". The intent of this chapter is to clarify the specific requirements of the law as they pertain to the Catholic community. 


New Roman Missal

Lee Nagel, Executive Director, National Conference for Catechetical Leadership (NCCL) alerted Catechetical leaders in his May 3 newsletter about the approval of the new Roman Missal and NCPD passes it on to Disability Ministry diocesan directors and leaders, as well. The New Roman Missal is APPROVED: An Opportunity for Catechesis



The *Roman Missal, Third Edition*, the ritual text containing prayers and instructions for the celebration of the Mass, has been approved by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments. The complete text of the *Roman Missal* is still undergoing final editing by Vatican officials. It is expected to be forwarded to Conferences of Bishops later this spring, at which time it will be prepared for publication. <http://www.usccb.org/romanmissal/index.shtml>

May's Year for Priest's Feature: Fr. Rick Curry, S.J.


Jesuit Brother Rick Curry has a new vocation. He's now Jesuit Father Rick Curry. Becoming a priest at age 66, as he did Sept. 13, 2009, might seem to be a "late vocation," but the term doesn't apply in a typical sense to Father Curry.

In 2002, after Father Curry had spent 27 years as a Jesuit brother working with his National Theatre Workshop of the Handicapped, the workshop administrators were asked to bring returning wounded vets from Afghanistan and Iraq to begin a writers' program so that they could tell their own stories and, as Father Curry

told Catholic News Service, "open up the floodgates of post-traumatic stress."

"It was during that time that I began to be asked by the Wounded Warriors (the eventual name of the program) to actually hear their confession. I told them I was a Jesuit brother and not ordained. I told them that so frequently that I began to suspect there was some invitation there," Father Curry said. "I was so happy as a Jesuit brother I never thought of it (priesthood)."

Fr. Curry was born without a right forearm, earned a PhD in theater from New York University, and he's even played a psychiatrist on the television detective series "Monk." But he is perhaps best known as [continued...](#)


