

Priests Presented NCPD 2010 SERVANT-LEADER AWARDS

At its May 25 NCPD Friends Founders Dinner, NCPD presented its 2010 Servant-Leader Awards to Fr. Wayne Ball and Fr. Rick Curry, SJ. Both men have been featured in recent E-NEWS articles highlighting priests with disabilities during the Year for Priests (click here for Fr. Ball and here for Fr. Curry).

Fr. Wayne, fluent in eight languages and a Canon Lawyer, is a pastor in the Diocese of Richmond and serves in the Tribunal. Fr. Curry founded the National Theatre Workshop of the Handicapped in 1977, and recently founded the Veterans Academy at Georgetown University to support veterans with disabilities and post

In presenting the awards, Janice Benton, NCPD executive director, noted: "We are pleased tonight to present to you two men who are serving our community in their unique roles as priests. Special Guest Theodore Cardinal McCarrick presented the awards to Fathers Ball and Curry. In his Invocation, Cardinal McCarrick acknowledged that each of us is "wonderfully made" by our loving God, and that we are all called to serve God in "wonderful ways."

Marsha Rivas, Equal Access Ministry, Diocese of Toledo Disability Ministry, sent us this Tip Sheet on Tourette Syndrome to share with you by download. Tourette Syndrome (TS) is a chronic hereditary neurobiological disorder that is characterized by tics, which are involuntary sudden repetitive movements and/or vocal outbursts. TS occurs in 1 out of every 1000 persons. Symptoms usually begin between the ages of 6 and 10, and it is 3

USCCB on Healthcare Reform: Setting the Record Straight

The U.S. bishops' position on health care reform for the nation has been "misrepresented, misunderstood and misused for political and other purposes," according to a statement from three prelates most directly involved in the debate.

The bishops who lead the respective committees on pro-life advocacy, justice and human development, and migration released a statement Thursday, May 25, 2010, called "Setting the Record Straight."

They affirmed their position over the course of the year of debate was "unified and consistent."

Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, Archbishop of Galveston-Houston, Chairman of the Committee on Pro-Life Activities and Episcopal Moderator of the National Catholic Partnership on Disability; Bishop William Murphy of Rockville Centre, Chairman of the Committee on Domestic Justice, Peace and Human Development; and Bishop John Wester of Salt Lake City, Chairman of the Committee on Migration, signed the statement.

USCCB Action Alert: Help Families Impacted by the Recession

The House and Senate are considering a bill, *The American Jobs and Closing Tax Loopholes Act* (H.R. 4213), that would, among other things, provide initial funding for the National Housing Trust Fund, continue support for job creation through the TANF emergency fund, and extend eligibility for unemployment insurance benefits through December 31, 2010. At this link, you will find an alert with more information.

Contact your Representative and Senators and urge them to help families still struggling from the impacts of the economic recession by including the following in *The American Jobs and Closing Tax Loopholes Act* (H.R. 4213):

- Urge funding for the National Housing Trust Fund that will provide housing for very low-income families and maintain and create jobs in the hard hit construction industry.
- Urge continued funding for the successful job creation program for low-income youth.
- Urge the extension of unemployment insurance eligibility for laid-off workers through the end of this year.



Book Review

"Waiting for Eli: A Father's Journey from Fear to Faith" is Chad Judice's journal of hope and renewed faith in the face of expecting a son diagnosed with spina bifida, and hydrocephalus, and a prognosis that did not fit into Judice's plans for his family. It is also the story of how one unborn baby brought an entire community to its knees and led a family into the heart of Jesus.





At the close of the 2005 school year at Cathedral-Carmel Catholic School, 7th & 8th grade Social Studies teacher and basketball coach Chad Judice allowed his students to ask him a question about himself. It would be his last year at CCCS, and he would be teaching some of these same students in the fall at his new position at St. Thomas More High School. He wanted them to know that he was both a teacher and a friend. In all his years there, it was the first time anyone had asked the question, "What do you fear most?"

The answer required little thought: "My greatest fear handican"

would be to have a child with a mental or physical handicap."

Following the Footsteps of St. Paul

Fr. John Sheehan, SJ of the Xavier Society for the Blind (www.xaviersocietyfortheblind.org) is leading a pilgrimage to Greece and Turkey called "Following the Footsteps of St. Paul," from October 11 to 22nd and the basic cost is only \$3,999. But if you are a daring sort, they are having a raffle, and the First Prize is 2 tickets on this pilgrimage trip. A ticket includes everything - air fare, meals (2 a day on land, 3 a day on the ship), hotel and outside cabin (double occupancy) and local air-conditioned transport. So you and a companion get to go to the Holy Land for \$65 - if you win the Raffle.

A raffle ticket is only \$65 (2 for \$100) and there are only 299 tickets available. The drawing will be held on July 20, 2010. If you win and don't choose to go, you may donate your tickets for a tax deduction and two blind people will be given the chance to take the trip. Or you may take a \$4,000 cash prize. New Online Catholic Bible Search Engine

A new online Bible platform that enables people to find specific Scripture passages using keywords, was launched last week.

The program was officially released to the public on May 13 by <u>Catholic.net</u>. The press release noted that this is the first complete Catholic Bible made available for keyword search. It added that an English and Spanish Bible, both translations approved by the Vatican, are being offered for searching through the program.

The search engine allows users to share Bible passages with their blogs, with Facebook and Twitter, and with other social media Web sites. It also allows people to add a search widget to their own personal Web page.

The project was undertaken with partial funding from the U.S. bishops' conference, and with the help of volunteers from a Catholic.net social aid program in Mexico.
